Introduction

What would Benjamin Franklin do? It's a question I quite often ask myself, not that I could emulate even a fraction of his accomplishments. Never the less, it is a good way to start any undertaking, looking toward one's role models for guidance. I have no doubt that if Ben *were* here; his advice to me would be ambiguous and clandestine, as it often was, until the manner of his service was thoroughly in his grasp. And then he would wisely suggest that I turn to another role model for my answers, the one by which I will surely be measured, Kline Pugh. And that is something I have found myself doing almost daily since being sworn-in as State Secretary. So I must plead for your patience as I learn the procedures and processes of a rather vast set of responsibilities.

Background

I was first approached with the idea of becoming the state secretary almost eleven months ago. That lead time was very important because my first concern was how to transition membership data from a database system that was no longer being supported by the original software designers to a more modern system. I do not care to count the hours required. But I am happy to report that the Georgia Society Membership Database, now in Microsoft Access 2007, is functioning well and has been expanded to track key elements of membership applications and supplements, Officer and Committee Chair positions held by compatriots and membership sponsorship of new applicants. Information about chapters will also be tracked. In years to come, long after I pass the baton to another, the system will be able to provide reports concerning compatriot applications, sponsorship of new applicants, and positions held in the SAR.

Group Email Lists

I asked Mark Webb to set up several Email Lists which I administer in order to expedite emails intended for various groups of compatriots. Right now, there are three Email Lists available: **BOM, Grave Marking, and Bulletin**. Each list is designed for specific content. For instance, I initially subscribed only Georgia Society Board of Managers and state Committee Chairmen to the **BOM** mailing list since it is designed for quarterly Georgia Society BOM reports and other broadcast correspondence relevant to the Board of Managers. The **Grave Marking** list may also contain DAR members, City or State officials, and individuals from other states who want to be kept apprised of Grave Markings and Historical Site events sponsored by or in-part by the Georgia Society. The **Bulletin** list is what used to be referred to as "*Widest Distribution*" that would be requested of Kline Pugh for forwarding. Announcements other than Grave Markings and Historical Site events that need to be shared with the entire Georgia Society community should be emailed to **Bulletin**. Instructions for subscribing or unsubscribing to any of these lists are available on the www.georgiasocietysar.org website under **<Resources><Mailing Lists>**. You must be logged in with Username and Password to see the **<Mailing Lists>** link under **<Resources>**.

Vision

On a forward going basis, I will permanently maintain information with regard to deceased compatriots. Therefore, it is important that **Chapter Presidents or Chapter Secretaries keep me informed of the death of a compatriot (Form 10.04F in the Source Book)**. That will allow us to retain information and, one day, create a memorial webpage, possibly with photos, short biographies and lists of contributions of those members who are no longer with us. That is one day. But right now, if Ben Franklin were here, I think he would say, "*What is all this talk of computers, databases, and emails. Pass the type.*" So pass the type I will.

Membership

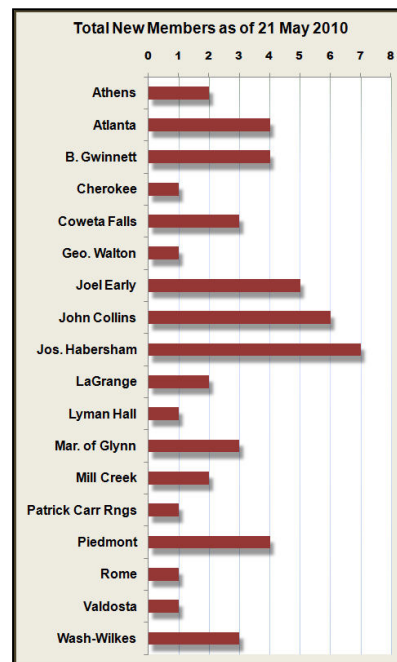
The Georgia Society membership is growing. I have included a chart showing the number of new members registered to each chapter. Congratulations are in order to the

Joseph Habersham Chapter for leading the way with 7 new members. The total membership of the Georgia Society, through 21 May 2010 stands at 1,405. That includes 3-Emeritus, 2-Junior (1 of which will become a regular member in October), 29-Life Members that have paid 2010 GA Society Dues, 51-New Members, 102-Reinstatements, and 5-Transferees from other State Societies.

Summer will be over before we know it. Many of our chapters are planning now for their youth education programs. We hope each of you will incorporate into your chapter activity something new this year.

The Poster Contest is only one of our education programs. Consider recognizing a fourth grade or high school social studies teacher and nominating them for state recognition in December; nominate one of your members for the John Dooley Education Outreach Award; recognize one of your wives or DAR members helping in SAR education programs with a nomination for the Nancy Hart Education Outreach Award; win the Dr. Lyman Hall Education Outreach Award for your chapter if your program was the most improved in 2010; or give programs to over 1,000 students this year to receive the chapter Education Outreach Streamer.

An outline of each award with guidelines, prize amounts, and deadlines was recently e-mailed to Board of Managers members and the information is located in our web edition of the Source Book in section 17.13. The June BOM report for the Education Committee gives tips for competing for these awards.

Most of these awards have a deadline of December 15, 2010. Of note, the next Poster Contest will not be judged until April 15, 2011.

Note: Subject of this year's poster contest: **Battle of Cowpens.**

GASSAR Education Committee 2010 Contests and Awards Information

Revised April 18, 2010

Americanism Poster Contest

Contest Description: This contest is open to students at the fourth or fifth grade level depending at which grade level they are taught about the Revolutionary War. Scout groups are also subject to compete at the same grade levels. Awards and judging are done at the chapter, state, and national level. Students are given a specific theme for the contest as announced by the National Society and compete by preparing a standard size poster addressing the given theme. Judging is based on addressing the theme, showing evidence of research, neatness, and originality.

Theme: The theme for the 2010-2011 school year will be announced at the National Congress in June 2010. The theme will be disseminated to the Georgia Society chapters by the State Education Committee and posted on our GASSAR website by July 15, 2010.

Contest Guidelines: Contest rules often change from year to year, thus the most current rules should be reviewed. Any changes in the poster contest procedures from the 2009-2010 school year will be announced by the State Education Committee and posted on the GASSAR web site when they are announced by the National Society. Chapters determine their own local awards and methods of judging. A chapter is authorized to submit one poster at the end of their own

local judging to compete at the state level.

With the change in the annual conference of the Georgia Society from April to January beginning this year in 2010, there will also be a change in the scheduling and judging of the poster contest. There has always been difficulty in obtaining entries and judging them prior to our annual conference in early April because most 4th grade classes do not study the American Revolution until late spring. As it would be even more impractical to try to close out the theme in December in order to announce a winner in January, the poster contest will not be judged until May 2011, thus encouraging more teachers to agree to participate in the contest. The poster winners will then be judged prior to the end of the school year and the winners announced before school lets out.

Awards: The prizes for the top five winning students will be 1st place \$100.00; 2nd \$75.00; 3rd \$50.00; 4th \$30.00; and 5th \$15.00. Each student will also receive an appropriate first through fifth place ribbon and certificate. Each SAR chapter submitting a poster into the state competition will receive a certificate recognizing their participation in the poster contest.

Deadline: April 15, 2011, is the final date for the first place poster for each chapter to be in the hands of the State Education Committee Chairman. The posters entered at the state level competition will be judged during the period April 16-21. Each chapter can set any earlier date they may choose for their own judging deadline as long as the April

deadline is met for state competition. The 1st through 5th place winners will be announced on or about April 22, 2011.

Outstanding Social Studies Teacher Award

Contest Description: This contest is open to middle and secondary (high school) social studies teachers in Georgia that provide instruction on the Revolutionary War. Awards and judging are done at the chapter and state levels. Chapters may enter one contestant at the state level of competition. The judging is based on written narrative provided by the teacher, school administrators, the teacher's supervisors, students, and/or SAR and DAR members describing outstanding methods in use by the teacher for instructing the Revolutionary War to their students. Examples of innovative and successful teaching materials are also considered in the judging. A teacher may only receive the award once at the state level.

Contest Guidelines: Chapters determine their own local means of selecting or recognizing teachers. No standard format for submitting a teacher at the state level is required, but a submission should provide sufficient information to convince judges of the outstanding nature of instruction being provided. The period of instruction for consideration is the current school year to date and the most previous two school years (August 2008 – May 2010).

Awards: A certificate and plaque will be awarded at the GASSAR annual conference to which the winner and their guest (usually their spouse) will be invited. Each chapter's entrant will receive a certificate (one per chapter) of recognition and each chapter participating with an entry will be recognized with a certificate.

Deadline: The deadline for submissions of packets for recommendation for the award is a postmark of December 15, 2010. The winning entrant will be selected by December 20th.

Outstanding Elementary Teacher Award

The award for the Outstanding Elementary Teacher follows the same guidelines as those given in the previous section for the Outstanding Social Studies Teacher Award except that the recognition is given to an elementary school teacher for outstanding instruction of the Revolutionary War to elementary school students.

Chapters may submit recommendations for both the Outstanding Social Studies Teacher and the Outstanding Elementary School Teacher.

Tom and Betty Lawrence History Teacher (Essay) Contest

Contest Description: This contest is open to middle and secondary (high school) social studies teachers in Georgia that provide instruction on the Revolutionary War. The judging is based on a written essay, curriculum vitae of educational and professional background, and letters of recommendation from a supervisor and Principal. The essay must be 500 words or longer discussing the importance of teaching the American Revolution, and providing details of any extraordinary teaching techniques or innovative projects used to teach the American Revolution. It should also discuss why the applicant wants to attend the Freedoms Foundation Summer Graduate Teacher Workshop and how the teacher would use what is learned at the workshop in future classes.

Contest Guidelines: Awards and judging are done at the state and national levels. Chapters may enter as many contestants at the state level of competition as they wish. Required application forms are available on the national SAR website.

Awards: A certificate and \$100 cash award will be awarded at the GASSAR annual conference to the state winner whose application will be submitted to the national contest. Each chapter's entrant will receive a certificate (one per chapter) of recognition and each chapter

participating with an entry will be recognized with a certificate. The national winner will win an expense paid trip to the Freedoms Foundation Summer Graduate Teacher Workshop.

Deadline: Completed applications must be submitted to a local chapter by December 15. Chapters must submit postmarked entries to the State Education Committee Chairman by January 5, 2011. The state winner will be selected by January 10, 2011.

John Dooley Education Outreach Award

Contest Description: This award goes to a GASSAR member who has significantly contributed their time and efforts in an outstanding manner to our youth and adult education outreach program during the calendar year. The award is given at the state level. No standard format for submitting a member at the state level is required, but a submission should provide sufficient information to convince judges of the outstanding nature of program participation and activity for the year. The period of activity for consideration is the current calendar year January through November (2010).

Contest Guidelines: A chapter can nominate one member each year. A person may only receive the award once.

Awards: A certificate and plaque will be awarded at the GASSAR annual conference to the winner. Each chapter's entrant will receive a certificate (one per chapter) of recognition.

Deadline: The deadline for submissions of packets for recommendation for the award is a postmark of December 15, 2010. The winning entrant will be selected by December 20th.

Nancy Hart Education Outreach Award

Contest Description: This award goes to a female who has significantly contributed their time and efforts in an outstanding manner to our youth and adult education outreach program during

the calendar year. The award is given at the state level. No standard format for submitting a recommendation at the state level is required, but a submission should provide sufficient information to convince judges of the outstanding nature of program participation and activity for the year. The period of activity for consideration is the current calendar year January through November (2010).

Contest Guidelines: A chapter can nominate one female each year. A person may only receive the award once.

Awards: A certificate and plaque will be awarded at the GASSAR annual conference to the winner. Each chapter's entrant will receive a certificate (one per chapter) of recognition.

Deadline: The deadline for submissions of packets for recommendation for the award is a postmark of December 15, 2010. The winning entrant will be selected by December 20th.

Dr. Lyman Hall Education Outreach Award

Contest Description: This award goes to the chapter that has shown the most improvement in their GASSAR Education Outreach program during the current year (2010) from the previous year (2009). The award is given at the state level. No standard format for submitting a recommendation at the state level is required, but a submission should provide sufficient information to convince judges of the level of improvement from the previous year. Thus, a description of the prior year activity as well as the current year is necessary. The period of activity for consideration in the current calendar year is January through November (2010).

Contest Guidelines: Any chapter with an education outreach program can nominate their chapter for consideration. A chapter may receive the award in successive years.

Awards: A certificate and a \$100 cash prize to the chapter for use in improvements in its outreach program

will be awarded at the GASSAR annual conference to the winner. Each chapter entrant will receive a certificate of recognition.

Deadline: The deadline for submissions of packets for recommendation for the award is a postmark of December 15, 2010. The winning entrant will be selected by December 20th.

Chapter Education Outreach Streamer Award

Contest Description: This certificate and streamer is presented at the GASSAR annual conference to any chapter that has sponsored education outreach programs to a total of 1,000 or more students during the year.

Contest Guidelines: The quarterly chapter Board of Managers reports will be used as a primary source of compiling figures to use in award of this program. Thus, chapters should ensure that their reports include estimates of the numbers of youths addressed in their outreach programs. Any chapter not sure that their BOM reports have reported the numbers needed for this recognition may make a report at the end of the year (prior to December 16) to the Education Committee Chairman.

Awards: All chapters meeting the criteria will receive the certificate and streamer.

Deadline: A December 15 deadline is required to allow sufficient time to order streamers. Thus, BOM reports for the fourth quarter submitted after December 15 cannot be used to compile statistics. If needed, report separately the education outreach statistics for October and November prior to December 16th.

Education Program Timeline Checklist

July 15, 2010 – The GASSAR Education Committee will disseminate to the chapters the theme for the 2010-2011 poster contest.

December 1, 2010 – If eligible for the Education Outreach Streamer for

programs to over 1,000 students, report the statistics to the State Education Committee Chairman if the chapter's BOM reports will not have not reported cumulative figures before December 16.

December 15, 2010 – Submissions for the Tom & Betty Lawrence History Teacher (Essay) Contest must be in to chapters.

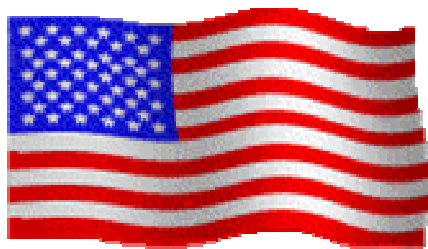
December 15, 2010 – Submission packets for the following award recommendations must be postmarked by this date and sent to the State Education Committee Chairman.

- Outstanding Elementary School Teacher Award
- John Dooley Education Outreach Award (Compatriot)
- Nancy Hart Education Outreach Award (Female)
- Dr. Lyman Hall Education Outreach Award (Most Improved Chapter)

January 5, 2011 – Chapter submissions to the state for the Tom & Betty Lawrence History Teacher Award must be postmarked on or before this date.

April 15, 2011 – This is the deadline for chapters' poster contest entries to be received by the State Education Committee Chairman.

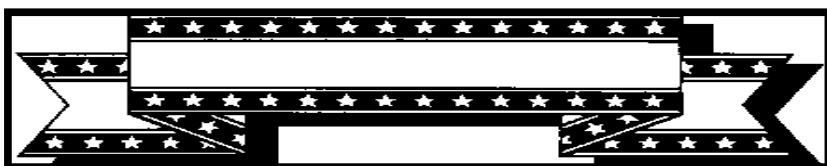

Georgia Society participates in Pilot JROTC Program

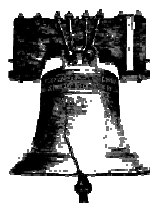
Independence concluding with “we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor”.

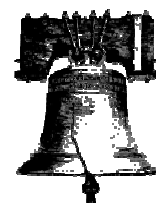

REVOLUTIONARY WAR INFANTRYMAN MONUMENT NATIONAL INFANTRY MUSEUM COLUMBUS AND FORT BENNING, GEORGIA

The Revolutionary War Infantryman Monument, presented in 2009 to the new National Infantry Museum by the Coweta Falls Chapter of Columbus, Georgia, was recently upgraded with two custom-designed benches and a quotation from General George Washington.

Although the monument is now owned by the National Infantry Foundation, the Museum agreed to the Chapter-financed improvements. The architectural firm of Neal and Murray looked at the monument sitting in its twenty-foot quadrangle on the Heritage Walk of Flags and designed corner benches of the same Georgia gray and American Black granite of the original monument. To select the added George Washington inscription, a contest was held by the Coweta Falls Chapter. The winner was chosen from fifteen entries. Installation was completed in April 2010 by the Eagle Granite Co. of Elberton, GA. The cost of approximately \$5000 was paid by Chapter members, a local Foundation, and the George Washington Fund Distribution Committee.

The winning quotation was by General George Washington to his troops in August of 1776: "Remember, officers and soldiers, that you are free men fighting for the blessings of liberty."

The SAR monument to the Revolutionary War Infantryman is viewed, and frequently photographed, by an estimated 130,000 Museum visitors annually.
