 again into the service under Captain Partridge, granted to James  
 Town, having first joined the main Army under Genl. Lawson  
 at the ground Squirrel Bridge, was in hearing of the firing  
 at the Battle of James over 4 next night after the Battle much  
 by moonshine to the Battleground - was fired upon and a ten  
 to. prof? Hickory Nutt. Church where wounded persons, were  
 receding and from thence to Mobbin Hill, to Richmond -  
 to Newcastle upon Parmenter River & there met. Col. Samuel  
 Co. after then lately exchanged from British Composurement -  
 before they got to Jamestown. The Army prepared for Battle at  
 the Big Spring - Mr. Mason, the officer, an Ensign with officers  
 who commanded the section in position to which Deponent & his  
 others, John Cash, belonged. Slipped off horse, in Amherst  
 which gave the field to which the powder was. The name  
 of Mr. Mason's file - About this time, Genl. Lawson from  
 some misconduct was deprived of his post, and his command  
 given to General Stevens. There was a suspicion against Lawson  
 that he held back from the Battle, he did lie by, during the  
 day it rained the whole night, on command from Newcastle  
 deponent was marched towards York, in relief from Amherst  
 overtook them at the Peachy Plain old Field - where he was dis-  
 charged with others, on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of August immediately  
 succeeding the capture of Louisbourg on October. Deponent  
 received a written discharge, which is lost - He was three  
 months in this service.

Deponent was taken sick at Mobbin Hill, and was kept out of  
 the Hospital, by John Cash - for forming his Camp duties  
 and deponents who remained sick until after Wallace was  
 taken so until Thornton - he was attended by Doctor  
 John Power Deponent - was born & raised in Amherst -  
 some of his neighbours were, Hugh Cahoon, Peter & John Rice  
 Lebarlet John Tolliver & others - lived in Amherst, until called  
 out against the insurgents - or Mullifiers - of Pennington  
 under Genl. Tucker Capt. John Tolliver - ensign Henry  
 Wallinger - Lieutenant - Wm. Tolliver - orderly sergeant  
 Genl. Matthews - Commander - remained three months  
 (lasting some days) and was dismissed - Deponent lived  
 in Rocking County with go Alexander one year with the  
 widow McDaniel, Mother of Col. James McDowell, now living  
 near Fairfax, one year then in Amherst, near the Road to  
 Tolliver's & Bradford's - & Cobble's until April 1827 - & then  
 moved to George's his neighbours - are, John Hays - Dan  
 Coy. Thomas Johnston, John Wallace, and General Grayard -  
 of Ga. at present may be informant - He hereby claims every claim  
 that he is entitled to or annuity except the present and claims that his name  
 is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state - that he never has recd  
 one cent of compensation, except for that service against the Indians  
 during the war of 1811 & 1812 - James Lawson
