On the twenty-third day of November in the year eighteen hundred and thirty-two personally appeared before the Inferior Court of said County & State, Daniel Brown aged seventy one years, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832, that he enlisted in the army of the United States in the latter part of the year seventeen hundred & seventy nine or the first part of the year seventeen hundred & eighty, (he thinks the latter) with Capt. John Mills, (the name of the commanding officer not recollecting) and served in the tenth regiment of the continental line, under the following named officers, Capt. Col. Dickson, Major Murphy, Capt. John Mills, Lieutenant Farmer, & Ensign Beckstone, & served under the said officers until he was discharged at the close of the war. At the time of enlistment this declarant resided in the State of North Carolina, in Orange County, he was in a ~~detachment~~ at Lindley's Mills in North Carolina and also in another at Wilcox's Iron works in the same State, both being ~~parties~~ of detachments from the army, though he marched <sup>with</sup> through North & South Carolina - he was in Charlotte at the time of the

siege of that city, but at the time of the surrender was off  
on duty with a small detachment of heavy cavalry.  
The said defendant was on the pension roll under the act of  
March 1st 1818. & was dropped therefrom on account of  
property, his residence then being in said County in the State  
of Tennessee. He has since made application of written  
stands that he has ~~under this~~ been restored to  
the pension roll for the Regency of the State of Virginia.  
He is entitled to a pension from the 27<sup>th</sup> of March 1839.

The said Daniel Blawie having ~~wholly~~ given up any claim  
whatever to a pension or annuity, except the present, &  
he declares that his name is not on the pension roll  
of any Regency in any State except that of the State  
of Virginia as aforesaid. He also states that he delivered  
his certificate of Pension some years ago to the Hon James  
Meriwether then a member of Congress from this State, &  
that he hath not since seen the same. & the said James  
hath removed from the State to some part of Tennessee  
unknown to this declarant.

## SCHEDULE.

*Declaration, in order to be continued on the Pension List, under the Act of  
May 1st, 1820.*

*County of Burnett ss. State of Georgia*

On this 17<sup>th</sup> day of March 1831, personally appeared in open court, (a) being a court of record (b) for the [district, circuit, county, or corporation, as the case may be,] above named witness,

resident in said county, aged sixty eight years, who, being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress, of the 18th March, 1818, and the 1st of May, 1820; that he, the said ~~Daniel L. Brown~~ enlisted (c) for the term of ~~one year~~ on the ~~18th March~~ day of ~~February~~ in the year 1780 in the State of ~~North Carolina~~ in the company (d) commanded by captain ~~John McRae~~ in the regiment commanded by colonel ~~Dixie~~ in the line of the State of ~~North Carolina~~ on the ~~Continental~~ continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps ~~for several~~ until April ~~1785~~ when he was discharged from the service in the State of ~~South Carolina~~; that he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension, except the present; that his name has been placed on the pension list, that the number of his pension certificate is ~~not available~~ and that he never before exhibited a schedule of his property, because (e) while ~~misfortune~~ misfortune had stripped him of his little property to a ~~surviving~~ ~~and~~ his frame he considered that the County of his County was not under the act of Congress to extend it to him.

And, in pursuance of the act of the 1st May, 1820, I do solemnly swear, (or affirm, as the case may be,) that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts due to me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. (f) That, since the 18th of March, 1818, the following changes have been made in my property. (g)

At that time there was due me about eight hundred Dollars. Of this sum three hundred & fifty Dollars was expended in the purchase of a slave which was contributed to the sum of one Archaibald Wilson's property, and after expending ~~300~~ all the property from said slave for three years with the exception of that to the slave-holds, was sold him. Total

to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts due to me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. (f). That, since the 18th of March, 1818, the following changes have been made in my property. (g)

At that time there was due me about eight hundred Dollars. Of this sum three hundred & fifty Dollars was expended in the purchase of a slave house which was estimated to be \$800 of the Archibald Wilson's property.

350 & I have not nor ever expect to recover any part of the sum of such value. These hundred Dollars of said first mentioned sum was paid in 360 for the purchase of a tract of land 370 (copy of deeds to which are herewith enclosed,) of the said tract of land was conveyed by me to my son J. L. Wilson for the discharge of a debt of three hundred Dollars which I was owing him. I also loaned to the before mentioned Archibald Wilson thirty seven Dollars in the year 1817 while I have not recovered nor have I any prospect of it. In the year 380 1819 I was compelled to pay as security for William 390 testator of the Estate of John Bragg because one hundred & thirty three Dollars.

I also owned on the said 18th of March 1818 a wagon & four horses & two cows & calves. The cows and calves were sold in Tennessee for twenty five Dollars & others purchased in place of them after my removal to this State - they were sold to the same Archibald Wilson. Since that time all my cattle have died except those mentioned in the annexed Schedule - two of my horses have also died - my wagon nearly worn out & sold to one William Rogers for forty dollars, twelve Dollars & 50 cents of which is still due, the balance & the income of my own labour has been expended in the support of my family.

I beg leave further to state that I have learned that my name appears on the rolls of the Department of State as a twelve month man. The fact is nevertheless as I have before stated it, & for three more than three years of labour & suffering for my master, I have never received in any manner of compensation save four dollars upon my listing, one dollar & twenty six Dollars as pension

I beg leave further to state that I have learned that my name appears on the rolls of the Department of State as a twelve month man. The fact is nevertheless as I have before stated it, & for these more than three years of labour & suffering for my country I have never received in any manner any compensation save five dollars upon enlisting, one shirt & one pair of pantaloons or stockings, & forty six dollars as pension money in 1779 & 1820. I am now sixty eight years of age with no family but my wife sixty six years of age, both of us infirm & unable to perform any service labour. Sworn to, and declared, on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of March before the Clerk of the Superior Court of Common Pleas.

I do hereby certify, that it appears, to the satisfaction of the Court, that the said \_\_\_\_\_ did serve in the Revolutionary War, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of nine months, under one engagement, on the continental establishment. I also certify, that the foregoing oath (or affirmation) and the schedule thereto annexed, are truly copied from the records of the said Court; and I do further certify, that it is the opinion of the said Court, that the total amount in value of the property exhibited in the aforesaid schedule is \_\_\_\_\_ dollars and \_\_\_\_\_ cents.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and affixed the seal of the said Court, on this 18<sup>th</sup> day of April, 1831.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Daniel Morgan Clover, of Orange County, North Carolina.

There is no claim for pension or bounty land on file based upon the military service in the Revolutionary War of a Daniel Morgan Clover, or of a Morgan Clover. The record has been found of a Daniel Clover, who enlisted in Orange County, North Carolina. That record is furnished you herein, as found in the claim for pension, S.37865, based upon his military service in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Daniel Clover are not shown.

While residing in Orange County, North Carolina, Daniel Clover enlisted in February, 1780, served one year as a private in Captain Mills' Company, Colonel Archibald Lytle's and Henry Dixon's North Carolina Regiment and was in the battles of Lindsey's Mills and Wilgoon's Iron Works and at the siege of Charleston, South Carolina.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 6, 1839, while a resident of Giles County, Tennessee, at which time, he stated that he was in his fifty-ninth year and referred to one of his little sons but gave no name.

In 1831, he was living in Gwinnett County, Georgia, and stated that he was sixty-eight years of age and that his wife, name not given, was aged sixty-six years and that he had a son, John.

There are no further data as to soldier's family.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name and address of person paid and possibly the date of death of the Revolutionary War pensioner, Daniel Gloucy(5.37008), you should address the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city, and cite the following date:
