Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act
of Congress passed June 7, 1832

State of Georgia }
Franklin County }

On this twenty third day of July in the year Eighteen Hundred and
Thirty two personally appeared before the Superior Court of the County
and State aforesaid, now sitting, Peter Groover a resident
of Capt. Vaughan's District of said County & State, aged
Seventy years, who being first duly sworn according to
law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in
order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the
following offices & served as herein stated to wit
That he served in the Militia of the state of North Carolina
and entered said service in the year just before
the defeat of General Bates in the state of South Carolina
about fifteen miles South West of Camden S.C., was in said
battle & served three months at that time under Capt.
Trice and Major Armstrong, and General Bates. That
immediately on the expiration of the three months, upon which he
served another term of three months under Capt. Johnson who
was under the command of General Butler & was stationed
in Salisbury North Carolina, that immediately after his last
mentioned tour he served twelve months under Captain
Donaldson & Major Armstrong & Colonel Murphy and
Dixon & General Green. That he was in the battle at Cedar
Spring in South Carolina & was afterwards stationed at the
aboff hills of Santee in South Carolina, while there he
heard of General Lee's retreat & he was discharged on his way
home from Santee. That he served irregularly at various
other times making in all three or four years & was in several
skirmishes, but no other regular battles. He served the
first six months above recited as a private and the last
twelve as a corporal & afterwards served as a Sergeant
in the Light Horse under Captain Cowden.

² When he entered the service he was living in Orange County North
Carolina from thence he removed to the County of Franklin

State of Georgia, where he has resided ever since
There was an order for one man among every sixteen to go
into service and he entered the service as a substitute for
the sixteen the last 12 months, the two first terms of three
months each he was a substitute but does not recollect for
whom.

While he served, Capt. Donahue was promoted to a Major
Capt. Bush was an adjutant to his Battalion, Col. Lytle
an officer in the regular army was with them the last
12 months, does not recollect the offices except those he
before mentioned.

He received a discharge from Col. Dixon which he
has since lost. He does not recollect date with
sufficient accuracy to swear to them but presents the
date of his discharge of service (date, defeat) will be
sufficiently certain.

He is personally known to Nelson Osborne a preache
r to Jacob Redwine both of whom can testify to his
veracity of the latter to his having been dependent in
the service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present, and declares that
his name is not on the Pension roll of any agency
of any State within his knowledge or belief.

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REFERENCES

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the records of Revolutionary War soldiers named Jacob Groover, Peter Groover, Phillip Groover and of any others with surname Groover, who lived in Connecticut.

There is no claim for pension or bounty land on file based upon service in the Revolution of a Jewish brewer, or similar conditions of any Jewish brewer or brewer-keeper. Such claims are the subject of data furnished by this office in regard to soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

In order to identify the Territoriality for record of any other
soldier with surname GROVER, should it be on file, the full name and
as much as possible of the following data is referred to him and
appropriate forms of birth and death, places of residence at California,
and other service and known date of which.

The record has been found of a Peter Gwinnett, of Georgia, which
may be that of the soldier in whom you are interested. It is contained
herein as shown in pension claim No. 31717. Based upon his service in
the Revolutionary War.

Peter Gossner was born about 1850; the place of birth and date of
M.D. unknown; his wife unknown.

While a Resident of Orange County, North Carolina, Peter Clegg collected land before the arrival of General Lee, and served three months as private in Orange County, North Carolina, before entering the service. Clegg's horses were used at the battle of New Market, Virginia, by the Confederates, and he was captured and held in confinement at the Cavalry Barracks, New Market, Virginia, for two months. He was paroled at the close of the war, and returned to Orange County, North Carolina, where he resided until his death, which occurred in 1903.

occupy of light horses, and was in the battle of Bates Springs, being afterwards stationed at the Highville of ~~Carolina~~ in South Carolina. He stated that in addition to his regular service of one year nine months, he performed irregular service at many different times, during which he was in several skirmishes, and that his service ~~in all~~ amounted to three or four years, no further details of which were ~~given~~.

The soldier moved from Orange County, North Carolina, date not stated, to Franklin County, Georgia.

Peter Greer was allowed pension on his application executed July 23, 1888, at which time he was a resident of Franklin County, Georgia. He died July 11, 1901.

No family data appear in the claim.
