Certificate of witness by Captn Crawford

State of North Carolina Superior Court
Macon County 3rd day Octo-
ber 1832

On this 3rd day of October personally appeared
in open court before the Judge of our Superior
Court for Macon now sitting Mr. William
McBland a resident of Macon in the county
of Macon and State of North Carolina
aged twenty one years who being first duly
sworn according to law doth on his oath make
the following deposition in order to obtain the benefit
of the act of congress passed June 4th 1832

That he entered the service of the United
States under the following named officers, and
served as herein stated Gaffin Rutherford
brigadier general over whom was General Lincoln
Major General in the United States army
Francis Locke was colonel of the regiment
of the militia in which I served and
a certain — Lewis Major William Wilson
Captain Sertied the drum sometime in
the month of November 1778 and was discharged
on the tenth day of May 1779 this being
my first term of service My second term
of service commenced in June 1781 &
ended on the 19th of October in the same year
In the second term General Nathaniel Green
was our — Major General If a certain —
Madison our Colonel George Dowell Capt
John L. foot Legion I resided in Rowan County
and state of North Carolina when recruited
the service and was drafted as for my two previous

Terms - I was at the battle of the Cuttaw Springs
and at Cowans ford when Brigadier General
Davidson fled. In the first Campaign I
Marched through Charlotte in N.C. and Con-
tinued ^{with} ~~up~~ miles on to ~~Charlotte~~
S.C. on to ~~Charlotte~~ in the same State
then westward to Purisburg ten miles above
Savannah Georgia & up & down the Savannah
River ~~where~~ ^{was} discharged at the Smoky
Camps on said river. In the second War
we ~~underground~~ ^{were} at Salisbury North
Carolina and Marched thence to Charlotte
thence to Conder S.C. thence across the
Wateree river on the to Congaree at the
High Hills near Waynesboro where we
joined Genl. Greene thence to the Cuttaw-
Springs where we fought the battle & returned
with prisoners to Rowan thence on to
Virginia on ~~the~~ ^{the north} side of Dan River
25 miles where ~~we~~ ^{we} were released & returned
to the shallow ford on the ~~Dakin~~ river
where we were discharged. I served with a
regiment of the Maryland line at the battle
of which Col. Howard was ~~an~~ officer
Colonel Lee & Washington ~~were~~ ^{were}
our right & left - Lee on our right & Washington
on our left in the battle. I had discharge
some years ago but have lost them I have
in my possession a certificate of Capt
James Bradford certifying as to my services
when I was about to remove from his comp.
to provisions Company dated March 1st 1793
which is herewith transmitted.

To my five months tour I know a certain
Major ^{John} Carson if alive whose deposition I
have set forth.

I also served several short terms of what was
called Minuteman or voluntary service amounting
in all to about seven weeks. The first service
was between my first & last principal service
in the month of January 1781 and it was in
this term that I while serving as a picket guard
that I saw Genl. Davidson fall.

I was born in 1761 in ~~South~~ Scotland
I have no record of my age

I have lived in Rowan County & Iredell
County North Carolina ever since the revolu-
tionary war until the year 1827 when I
moved on Staywood Rd where I stay last Christmas
in to this County

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present, and declare const
My name is not on the pension roll of the agency
of any state

State aforesaid William McLeod first aged 60 years
to me well known and who being duly sworn
according to law declares that he is the admini-
strator of William McLeod ^{deceased} the aforesaid person
who was a private in the Company commanded
by Captain ^{in the Regiment of North Car-}
olina Militia Commanded by Colonel Dernaldson
in the Revolutionary War. That he believes his son
Hather the above named William McLeod volunteered
at Hillsbury in the State of North Carolina on

or about the day of A.D. 1780 for the
term of three months and was honorably discharged
at

State of North Carolina or about the

day of A.D. 1780. That the said William
McLeod ^{deceased} made application for a Land Warrant
on account of said service and that said Warrant
No. 7053 for 160 Acres issued September 29th 1855
and came to the possession of ^{Davy Goddard} ~~the deceased~~
and while in his possession was taken and transferred
by said Davy Goddard without any legal authority
from the said Warrantee. And that the said
deceased Warrantee never sold, assigned or voluntarily
parted with his right to said Warrant. That said
Warrantee William McLeod died on or about the

first day of January A.D. one thousand eight hundred
and fifty six in the County of Hartmane aforesaid
of Georgia. And that the said deceased Marriantie
left no widow nor minor Children surviving
her. But that he left William McLeod, Ebenezer
McLeod, Mason McLeod, Cornelia Howell; and
Roseannah Gaddis - — — — — only sur-
viving Children all of which are over 21 years
of age, and that the said deceased Marriantie died
intestate. And that the decedent has been
duly and lawfully appointed Administrator
of the said Marriantie William McLeod deceased.
And he hereby makes this Declaration for the
purpose of obtaining a Duplicate of said
Military Bounty Land Warrant, above described,
which may be due under the Act of Congress
approved June 23^d 1860, or any other Act. And
hereby Appoints Harry H. Franklin of Stock Hill
Georgia, his true and lawful Agent and
Attorney for him and his executors to prosecute
this his Cause for a Duplicate Warrant, or
Certificate and authorizes him to receive the same
when issued. Given under his hand and

in the Revolutionary War that he was drafted
into the service of the United States at
in the County of Rowan and State of North
Carolina on or about the 10th day of November A.D. 1777
for the term of six Months that he continued in
actual service for the term of Six Months and
was honorably discharged at Savannah Georgia in
the County of and State of South
Carolina on or about the 10th day of May A.D. 1778
or will now fully appear by reference to the Minutes
Tolls of said Company, that he is now in Possession
of the United States at the rate of Thirty three dollars
and thirty three cents per annum.

He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining
the Bounty Land Under the act of Congress giving
Bounty Land to certain Officers and Soldiers
who have been engaged in the military service of the
United States raised Under the Act of Congress
passed the 3rd day of March A.D. 1855, that he never
received bounty land, and no further more by these presents constitutes
Appoints and fully empowers William H. Derry of
Stock Hill Georgia his true and lawful Attorney
for him and in his name to prosecute to demand and

Received from the Government Officers of the United States the 3rd January, Land & Water to which he may be entitled under the Laws of the United States. Herby certifying all that his said Attorney may legally do in and about the premises above named.

Dear Madam:

You are advised from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 53063, it appears that William McLeod was born in August, 1761 in Scotland.

While residing in Rowan County, North Carolina, he enlisted in November or December, 1776 and served at various times until October 19, 1781, amounting to nearly one year in all, under Captains James Crawford, Morrison, William Wilson, or Wilson, and George Dowall, Colonels Francis Latta and Halsbury in the North Carolina troops and was at the battle of Eutaw Springs, under Colonel Howard for the Maryland troops.

After the Revolution he lived in Rowan and Iredell Counties, North Carolina and in 1827 moved to Haywood, North Carolina, thence to Macon, Macon County, North Carolina.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 9, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Macon, Macon County, North Carolina.

In 1848, he was residing in Union County, Georgia.

He died January 3, 1856 in Fannin County, Georgia, leaving no widow.

The following were the only surviving children:-William McLeod, Jr., in 1860 aged sixty years and a resident of Fannin County, Georgia; Ebenezer McLeod; Mason McLeod; Cornelius Howell and Roseannah Gaddis.

The name of their mother is not shown.

The above is the history of the only soldier named
William McLeod found on the Revolutionary War records of this
bureau.
