Certificate of service by Captm Crawford

Terms - I was at the battle of the Cataw^h Springs
and at Cowans Ford when Brigadier General
Davidson fell. In the first Campaign I
marched through Charlotte in N.C. and Camden
S.C. on to ^{within 10 miles} Charleston in the same State
thence westward to Purisburg ten miles above
Savannah Georgia & up & down the Savannah
River ~~to~~ ^{was} discharged at the Smoky
Camp on said river. In the second war
we undisplayed at Salisbury North
Carolina and marched thence to Charlotte
thence to Camden S.C. thence across the
Watson river on the to Congaree at the
High Hills near Waynesboro where we
joined Genl. Grant thence to the Cataw^h
Springs where we fought the battle & returned
with prisoners to Rowan thence on to
Virginia on ~~the~~ ^{the north} side of Dan River
20 miles when ~~you~~ ^{we} were relieved & returned
to the shallow ford on the Backus river
where we were discharged. I served with a
regiment of the Maryland line at the Cataw^h
Springs of which Col Howard was an
officer. Colonels Lee & Washington were
our right & left. Lee on our right & Washington
on our left in the battle. I had discharged
some years ago but have lost them I have
in my possession a certificate of Capt
James Crawford certifying as to my services
when I was about to transfer from his comp
to Morrisons Company dated March 16th 1792
which is herewith transmitted.

As to my five months war I know a certain
Major ^{Robert} Carson if alive whose deposition I
have sent for.

I also served several short terms of what was
called Minute or voluntary service amounting
in all to about seven weeks. The first service
was between my first & last principal service
in the month of January 1781 and it was in
this term that I witnessed as a pocket square
that I saw Genl Davidson fall.

I was born in 1761 in North Scotland

I have no record of my age

I have lived in Kewan County & Irdele
County North Carolina ever since the Revolutionary
war until the year 1827 when I
moved on Staywood & there last Christmas
in to this County

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present and declare that
my name is not on the pension roll of the army
of any state

istrator of William McLeod Senr? ^{deceased} the identical person
who was a private in the Company Commanded
by Captain _____ in the Regiment of North Car-
olina Militia Commanded by Colonel Desalmay
in the Revolutionary War, that he believes his father
the above named William McLeod volunteered
at Salisbury in the State of North Carolina on
or about the day of _____ A.D. 1780 for the
term of three months and was honorably discharged
at _____ State of North Carolina on or about the
day of _____ A.D. 1780. That the said William
McLeod Senr? made application for a Land Warrant
on account of said service and that said Warrant
No. 7053 for 160 Acres issued September 29th 1855,
and came to the possession of ^{Pinney Giddis} ~~the deceased~~ ~~Warrant~~
and while in his possession was taken and transferred
by said Pinney Giddis without any legal authority
from the said Warrant. And that the said
deceased Warrant never sold, assigned or voluntarily
parted with his right to said Warrant. That said
Warrant William McLeod died on or about the

third day of January - A. D. one thousand eight hundred
and fifty five in the County of Harrison and State
of Georgia. And that the said deceased Warrantee
Left no Widow nor Minor Children Surviving
him. But that he left William McLeod, Ebenezer
McLeod, Mason McLeod, Cornelia Howell, and
Roseannah Gaddis - only sur-
-viving Children all of which are over 21 years
of age, and that the said deceased Warrantee died
intestate. And that the decedent has been
duly and Lawfully appointed Administrator
of the said Warrantee William McLeod deceased,
And he hereby makes this Declaration for the
purpose of obtaining a Duplicate of said
Military Bounty Land Warrant, above described,
Which may be due under the act of Congress
approved June 23^d 1860, or any other act; And
hereby appoints Henry H. Walker of Stark Hill
Georgia, his true and Lawful Agent and
Attorney for him and his name to prosecute
this his Claim for a Duplicate Warrant, or
Certificate and authorizes him to receive the same

in the Revolutionary War that he was drafted
into the service of the United States at

Carolina on or about the 10th day of November A.D. 1777
for the term of six months that he continued in
actual service for the term of six months and
was honorably discharged at Savannah Georgia in
the County of ~~Rowan~~ and State of South
Carolina on or about the 10th day of May A.D. 1788
as will more fully appear by reference to the Muster
Rolls of said Company, that he is now a Pensioner
of the United States at the rate of thirty three dollars
and thirty three cents per annum.
He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtain-
ing the Bounty Land under the act of Congress grant-
ing Bounty Land to certain Officers and Soldiers
who have been engaged in the military service of the
United States passed under the the Act of Congress

Dear Madam:

You are advised from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 33063, it appears that William McLeod was born in August, 1761 in Scotland.

While residing in Rowan County, North Carolina, he enlisted in November or December, 1776 and served at various times until October 19, 1781, amounting to nearly one year in all, under Captains James Crawford, Morrison, William Wilson, or Tillson, and George Dowell, Colonels Francis Locke and Malmady in the North Carolina troops and was at the battles of Enter Springs, under Colonel Howard in the Maryland troops.

After the Revolution he lived in Rowan and Iredell Counties, North Carolina and in 1827 moved to Haywood, North Carolina, thence to Macon, Macon County, North Carolina.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 9, 1833, at which time he was a resident of Macon, Macon County, North Carolina.

In 1843, he was residing in Union County, Georgia.

He died January 3, 1856 in Fannin County, Georgia, leaving no widow.

The following were the only surviving children: William McLeod, Jr., in 1860 aged sixty years and a resident of Fannin County, Georgia; Epheser McLeod; Mason McLeod; Cornelia Howell and Rose-annah Gaddis.

The name of their mother is not shown.

The above is the history of the only soldier named
William Heford found on the Revolutionary War records of this
burden.
