{ Revolutionary Claim,
Act June 7, 1832.

Recorded by Wm. Rice — Clerk
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Declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of
the act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

State of Georgia, { On this 23rd day of October
Campbell County, in the year Eighteen hundred &
thirty three, personally appeared in open Court before
me, Fredy C. Thomas, one of the judges of the Superior
Court of State, now sitting, George Norwood
a subject of Georgia, in Campbell County, and said
said subject swears, that being first duly sworn
according to law, doth, on his oath, make the follow-
ing declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the
Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832, That he entered
the service of the United States under the following
named officers, and served as herein stated. That
he volunteered under Captain James Pickards in March
in the month of July 1780, that he cannot recollect the
day he went into service, that he thinks, our chief
was acting as Major, and Benjamin Newell Colonel.
That he volunteered in the County of Franklin, North
Carolina; that he marched directly to Peebles River by
the way of Ramsey Mills, Deep River, intending to
join the State ^{then} ~~now~~ in command of the Southern
Army. That he was killed near Peebles River, hoping
to obtain Arms, that Major ~~the~~ was killed, he
was in hearing of the cannon fired at or near
Barnard at the time of battle. Was directed to take
the field defeat in the march directly to Gold
Spring, where passing through Charlotte, N.C.
where he was killed a few days after General Ove-
rton or Davison, who took the command.
That after reaching Salisbury, he remained there
until regularly discharged, which discharge
is kept by Pickard. That in the above mentioned
period he served three months at least.
That about the first of January 1781, in Franklin
County N.C. he was substituted for a man

Months from under Captain James Richards, in the
place of our James Ross, that he marched to
Marscoton Warren County N.C. from Marscoton
by Marscoton to Hillsboro N.C. between
which last mentioned places his Captain was
changed, and for Charles took the place of
Captain Richards, that in this expedition John
Haworth, brother to this applicant, was killed
he does not now recollect the name of his Major,
that he went on to Gifford Court House N.C.
where he was in an engagement against the
British, that Col. Paul Williams had command
of the Companies and Mr. Butler was his Gen.
at the time of said Battle, from Gifford,
Butler ground, he marched directly to Roanoke
 Mills on Deep River after staying a short time
at a place called the "Iron Works" after making
Roanoke Mills, he remained there until discharged
that his discharge is lost, that he was discharged
about the first of April 1781, that he served
in the last mentioned expedition not less than
three months, that after returning home about
the 1st of August 1781, he again volunteered
three months, that he does not recollect the
names of Company officers nor of the Field Officers
except Col. John Franklin, Thos. Franklin &c
he marched to Wallaces N.C. where he remained
~~for~~ ~~as~~ ~~and~~ ~~near~~ ~~Merle~~ and there until home on
the following, being Richd, and soon after was
discharged, residing having passed in that
quarter, that during the last mentioned service
he acted as orderly Sergeant, that he has no
documentary evidence, and that he knows of no fact
that testimony he can give who can testify to his
service, he hereby relinquishes every claim to a
pension or compensation except the personal, and

declares that his name is not on the pension
roll of the Agency of any State.

Dear Sir

I received a communication
directed to George W. Norwood or his
heirs in relation to back pay
he stated - that George W. Norwood
heirs was entitled to his pension

a pension up to the time of his

Dear Madam:

I advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 31885, it appears that George Norwood enlisted in Franklin County, North Carolina and served in the North Carolina Troops, as follows:

From July 1780, three months as private in Captain James Richards' Company, Colonel Benjamin Seawell's Regiment.

From January 1, 1781, three months as private in Captains James Richards' and Joel Parish's Company, Colonel Ben Williams' Regiment, and was in the battle of Guilford.

From August 1, 1781, six or seven weeks as orderly sergeant in Colonel William Brickell's Regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 23, 1833, while a resident of Campbell County, Georgia, aged seventy years.

Soldier stated that his brother John, was lieutenant

in the three months service from January 1, 1781, but it does not appears that pension was ever claimed on account of the services of said John Norwood.

In 1854 it is stated that George Norwood died at his daughter's residence in Campbell County, Georgia, the date of his death is not given, nor is the name of his daughter mentioned. There are no further family data.
