Declarations in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832
State of Georgia S. P. On this tenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and
ninety three personally appeared in open Court before the Court of
Common Pleas of this County now sitting William Thompson resident of said County
and State Negro forty years who being first duly sworn did say and doth
make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 that he is such the service of the United
States under the following named Officer had served as his master that he served
in the service of the United States in the Revolutionary War as a volunteer under Capt.
Blunt in the Regiment commanded by Colonel McColl in Abbeville District
South Carolina that he served for about two months and was discharged afterwards
he returned to the service under General Pickens and continued in service for about
three years when he was dismissed at the end of the war he received \$1000.00 in charge
he was also during the war for a short time of duty under Genl Elyah Clark
of Georgia he was in a battle at a place called Reedy Branch on long Creek he was
also in a small skirmish with the Indians at Long Swamp he has no record of
his age or his position he was born in August last to Domingo in the year
1764 he has lived in South Carolina where he lived at the time of the entry the
war and was Georgia born became the 1000th Negro in the
state by making over every claim whatever to the position of master except
the price paid and the claim that his master is not on the position roll of any
Regiment of any State known to and recollects the day and year of his and

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of William Thompson who died in 1823 in Columbia County, Georgia.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, R. 10560, based upon the service of William Thompson, the only soldier of that name who applied for pension while living in Georgia that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

William Thompson was born March 14, 1764, in Augusta County, Virginia.

He applied for pension November 6, 1822, while living in Habersham County, Georgia.

It was alleged that while living in Abbeville District, South Carolina, he enlisted in 1778 or 1779 and served at various times until the close of the Revolution, amounting in all to about three years, as private with the South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia troops under Captains Dunn, Robert Black, Francis Carlyle, Robert Anderson, John Harris and William Baakin, and Colonels James McCall, Elijah Clarke and John Cunningham. It was alleged that he was in the battles of Reedy Branch and Long Swamp.

His claim for pension was not allowed as he failed to furnish proof of the alleged service, in accordance with the requirement of the pension law.

After the Revolution William Thompson moved to Pendleton District, South Carolina, where he lived until 1811 when he moved to Franklin County, Georgia. He then lived in Habersham County, Georgia. In 1834 he moved to Cass County, Georgia.

The papers in this claim contain no data relative to the soldier's family.
