Serving as president is a commitment of time that is not made lightly; and I could not take on this monumental task without their encouragement and support.

Compatriot Jessel, you have led the Georgia Society through what has continued to be a challenging time for all of us. It has been a distinct pleasure to serve as Senior Vice President with your guidance, and I shall work to maintain the high standard of honor, honesty, and integrity you have shown.

Thank you as well to the ladies of the DAR, especially those with us today. You have always made the compatriots of the SAR feel welcome whenever we are together, and we all in the SAR owe you much gratitude for your continued efforts in membership and fellowship.

Most certainly I must also thank several compatriots and friends whom I met very early in my membership. There are so many of you who have welcomed me over the years, but I would be remiss if I did not make special mention of Larry and Karin Guzy, George and Marty Thurmond, and Mike and Cilla Tomme. Thank you for so welcoming me from day one, more than 20 years ago. Your encouragement then and now makes a difference.

The Georgia Society in 2022 finds itself in an exciting position, as pending host of the 132nd Annual Congress. The congress planning committee has been working diligently to make this event a meaningful and memorable success. We anticipate upwards of 500 attendees joining us in July at the Hyatt Regency in historic Savannah. This congress takes on special significance, as it represents for many a first real opportunity to gather safely after a much too long absence. I truly hope everyone here makes plans to attend, and volunteers are always appreciated.

Whenever I am asked, "what is it that the SAR does?" I say that our mission is patriotic, historic, and educational: that we are a non-profit, non - partisan organization dedicated to promoting patriotism, preserving American history, and promoting education to our future generations.

Most all of us in this room know how we do these things; appearances of our award-winning Color Guard, grave markings and event commemorations, youth programs such as the outstanding ROTC cadet and Rumbaugh historical oration contests, and service to veterans to name just a few. While our efforts are well spent and valuable, there



is concern that, perhaps, we need to reach out even further. To invite guests to attend patriotic events, or youth contests, or other programs honoring outstanding members of our community. SAR needs you to help grow the audience of people with a respect for history and patriotism. We have an obligation to our organization, our ancestors, and our future, to reach out and share. The average citizen needs to be welcomed – THEY are the ones we need to reach.

Fortunately, the National Society is giving us the outline on how to do this. As we are all aware, the United States is in the middle of a years-long recognition of the 250th anniversary of American Independence. The National Society has formed the America 250 SAR Committee, a recognition program designed to encourage and recognize those SAR Compatriots, Chapters and States that participate in events which publicly educate, honor, and celebrate the events and heroes of the years preceding the Revolutionary War through the Treaty of Paris. The National Strategic Planning Committee is diligently working on a strategic plan with implementation guidance for meeting our America 250 objectives. To this end we will form a committee within GASSAR to lead and guide us through the various activities and programs in the coming years. There will be more to come on this, but for now, I would like to highlight one particular America 250 objective for us to achieve in 2022, taken from the current draft goals being generated by the Strategic Planning committee.

With the purpose of enhancing America's awareness and understanding of the American Revolution, we shall strive for a significant increase in Color Guard membership by 2026. This year, therefore, we want to add 36 to the rolls. That's just three per month, or really, just one new guardsman per chapter; if we have members who join with other member friends we will more than reach our goal.

I know we can do this! The best time to capture a new compatriot's attention is at that first meeting, when he receives his certificate and his rosette. He is ready and eager....let's have our color guard introduce him to the color guard! I can speak from personal experience. When I joined, Larry Guzy immediately encouraged me to join. He explained it was a great way to meet new members, a fun way to be involved in our work, and an opportunity to support and respect our ancestors. He was right on every count. The friends I have made in the color guard are friends to this day. I would wish that incredibly positive experience for every member of the Georgia Society. Let's make it happen! Commander Collins, what do you say? Please let me know what you need from the Executive Committee and the BOM in support of this endeavor. And, gentlemen, if you can count to four and know your left from your right, you can do this! (That's how it was explained to me!)

There is another 2022 goal for GASSAR, one that is very important to me personally, but before explaining it, a brief anecdote.

Back in the fall of 2020, I was speaking with one of my employees, a young woman just into her 30s. She said that she had never voted, and really wasn't going to bother with it. But I talked to her about how it's more than her vote, it's her voice. About how nothing can change if she doesn't make her voice heard. Also about how many people around the world would give anything to exercise this right. And you know what? She voted. She called me right afterwards, excited to tell me she had in fact voted, and she felt so good that she and her vote mattered. And you know what else? I FELT AMAZING! I reached this person – whether it was a sense of liberty, patriotism, or civic duty, I'm not sure which – but I connected.

However, gentlemen, if we are to stand for the values of liberty, patriotism, and civic duty, we must first live it internally. We have over 2,000 members in Georgia, across 35 chapters. Unfortunately, many chapters have found it challenging to send a single representative to the BOM meetings. But thanks to the outstanding work by Rick Reese and the rest of our IT team, we are able to conduct much of our business simultaneously in person and online. Every chapter must have a representative in attendance, and I am tasking the regional vice presidents with ensuring this takes place. In addition to meeting your obligations to visit your chapters, you are now being asked to work directly with the chapter presidents to ensure their representation at the BOM meetings. {{{No later than 7 days prior to each meeting, you will send to the attention of Senior Vice President David Ludley and Recording Secretary Ed Rigel Jr. the name of the representative attending, and if he will be doing so in person or online. For the remote delegates it is a simple process to get up on Saturday, and at 9:45 login via computer, tablet, or phone. Voting will be done for these hybrid meetings under the procedures outlined in Robert's Rules of Order.}}} Simply put, 100% chapter representation is imperative for our society to succeed in its mission to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and promote education to all generations.

So the next time you go to a grave marking, march in a parade, or attend a youth event – please invite your neighbor, a fellow parishioner, or a friend from work. And bring your whole family, too! You never know where that one experience could lead.

For 2022, we have so much to achieve. Let us work to add to our Color Guard rolls; let us ensure all our voices are represented; let us make progress on America 250; and in Savannah, let's welcome our members and guests with the warmth and enthusiasm we are known for! The Georgia Society is marching forward. Let us show everyone how it is done!

Thank you again for this honor, and for the trust you have placed in me, to lead and guide this outstanding organization. I look forward to seeing you again and seeing you often. God bless you all in your travels home, and God bless the United States of America.
































Dr. J. Fred Olive III, Librarian General - What does the SAR Genealogical and Research Library mean to you, to your research, and to you when you are not in SAR Library?

The Patriot Grave Marking Medal recognizes both past efforts to identify and report data on Revolutionary War graves and to encourage new efforts to identify graves. The Patriot(s) being honored must be prominently recognized in the service and printed program with a brief biography that includes the type of service during the Revolution.

The Compatriot must have participated in a prominent role during the planning and execution of the grave marking. The Compatriot must have participated, as defined above, in at least fifteen (15) grave marking events.

The Silver Roger Sherman Medal may be awarded to a compatriot in recognition of, and in appreciation of, outstanding services rendered to a State Society. The recipient must have served as an active officer for a minimum of two years, as an active Committee chairman for three years, or as an active member of a committee for four years.

The State Medal of Distinguished Service is the highest medal that can be awarded by a State Society President. The incumbent State President may present one medal during his term. A Compatriot may receive this medal only once.

Molly Pitcher Medal

To earn the Molly Pitcher Medal, a woman must be present at, and support, the SAR Color Guard at qualifying SAR Color Guard events. The same events that count toward earning the SAR Silver Color Guard Medal for SAR Color Guardsmen shall also count toward earning the Molly Pitcher Medal. In addition, participation in, and support of, State events, such as a State Society Annual Meeting or a State Society Board of Managers/Governors Meeting, shall also count toward earning the Molly Pitcher Medal. To earn the Molly Pitcher Medal, a woman must accrue at least three hundred (300) points.

The Bronze Color Guard Medal is for service at the State and/or Chapter levels. Each medal is awarded for at least three years of service at the applicable level. To earn an SAR Bronze Color Guard Medal, a Color Guardsman must accrue at least three hundred (300) points by participating in uniform at qualifying Chapter, State, or National Color Guard events.





Patriot Medal

The Patriot Medal is the highest award presented to a Compatriot by a State Society and recognizes long, faithful, outstanding and distinguished service at the state and/or chapter level. The Patriot Medal is awarded only by a State Society and may be presented only to an individual and may be received ONLY once. Service at the national level is not considered in making the award. It is desirable that it be presented at the annual meeting of the state society. A representative cannot accept the Patriot Medal. A Compatriot may receive this medal only once. State Societies are authorized 1 medal per 500 members, but are not required to issue all medals authorized. Medals not awarded may not be carried over to the next year.



Our first recipient has been a very active member of his chapter and the state society. Emil Leon Decker has been a member of the Sons of the American Revolution since November 02, 2015, when joining the Robert Forsyth Chapter. Compatriot Decker has served as the Georgia Society newsletter editor from 2019-Present. His work as Editor won the Graham T. Smallwood Jr. Award for Best Society Newsletter (500+ members with more than 10 pages) at the 2021 National Congress. At the chapter level, he has served as the Robert Forsyth Chapter Editor from 2016-Present; Chairman of the Education Outreach Committee from 2017-Present; Chairman of the Events Committee from 2019-Present and a member of the Youth Awards Committee from 2017-Present; Compatriot Decker has been instrumental in building the Chapter's Traveling Trunk Program, even going as far as building the actual trunk itself. He developed two Travelling Trunks for the chapter while training several members to participate. Since 2017, he has presented the Traveling Trunk Program to elementary and middle schools in Forsyth and Dawson Counties, reaching over 1000 students and educators every year, even when his in-person activities were curtailed by COVID-19. He has presented the program to SAR, DAR, Civic Organizations, multiple levels of Scouts, homeschoolers, and public-school classes. He has researched and created many other presentations, such as ones on Kings Mountain and General Lafayette. Compatriot Decker's activities led to the Robert Forsyth Chapter receiving the Ohanesian History Presentation Award at the 2021 National Congress. An avid craftsman, Compatriot Decker has put his talents to good use for both the Chapter and State. He designed a granite marker that has been used for Patriot Grave Markings and makes these available at low cost to the sponsoring Chapters. He also creates items such as cutting boards, coasters, and household decorations with a patriotic theme that he raffles at chapter meetings, with proceeds going to the Chapter's Education Committee. Compatriot Decked has been a member of the Elijah Clarke Militia since 2017, and participated in multiple events over the years, including national, state, and local events, to include the filming of the War Hill video shoot by the National Guard. He has encouraged others to join the Color Guard by purchasing or making militia uniforms. He researched source materials and published a booklet entitled, "The Well-Dressed Guardsman" used by the state color guard. Compatriot Decker was instrumental in setting up and promoting the first Robert Forsyth Chapter musket raffle, acquiring county sheriff approval, advertising, and promoting sales of tickets by visiting many Chapters during their monthly or quarterly meetings, to include the South Atlantic District. He produced an engraved wooden case for the brace of pistols that were the second raffle event. He regularly produced and donated SAR and Revolutionary themed items for raffle at in-person chapter meetings. All funds raised are placed in the Marshal Fund for the chapter. Compatriot Decker regularly collects flags from the Dawsonville Home Depot and coordinated with Piedmont Chapter and Ingram Funeral Home for annual flag retirement ceremonies. Compatriot Decker served 8+ years on active duty with the US Army in crypto security and tactical telecommunications, serving in the US, Germany, and in the Gulf War zone with a chemical decontamination unit. Compatriot Decker spent 32 years in the field of education, from elementary to technical collège, mostly teaching technology. He sponsored various student clubs, most notably the robotics club which served the technology programs in Forsyth County and throughout the state. He mentored multiple teachers from Forsyth and surrounding counties into the robotics program and hosted multiple tournaments including the Georgia State Championship where robotics students attended National or World Championships for each of the 10 years he sponsored. Compatriot Decker is a member of the Georgia Fellows. Congratulations to you, Compatriot Emil Decker.

Our next recipient has been a very active member of his chapter and the state society. Richard Paul Marsh has been a member of the SAR since July 5, 2012, joining the Atlanta Chapter. Compatriot Marsh serves the Georgia State Society as the Information Technology officer and Committee Chair. He is also the Atlanta Chapter Treasurer and IT Chairman. He enhanced the State SAR Web page to allow all 35 SAR Chapters to make dues payments (National, State and Local). He developed a custom online dues payment module now used by 21 chapters, facilitating the early collection of dues and enhancing membership retention. He implemented a successful webstore, providing merchandise sales and fundraising capabilities for 2022 National Congress in Savannah. He also has added a process to make payments for the 2022 National Congress Medal through the website. As Chairman of the Chapter Eagle Scout Committee, he works with the Eagle Scout Troops in the Atlanta Metro Region to increase their participation in the Eagle Scout Honors and Scholarship Program. Compatriot Marsh self-published and co-authored with David A. Noble the Revolutionary War reference book "Patriots in the Georgia Revolutionary War Engagements 1776-1782." This book was the result of researching thousands of Revolutionary War pension applications, books and documents from other states. The names of Patriots, their officers, other Patriots with which they associated, and the Georgia engagements in which they participated are detailed in the book. It won the National SAR Minnesota Stephen Taylor Award in 2017 for the compatriot, who by his research and writing, has made a significant contribution to the preservation of history of the American Revolutionary era and its patriots. Book sales have

raised in excess of \$20,000 to support preservation of Georgia Revolutionary War Battle Sites. Compatriot Marsh is also the Atlanta Chapter webmaster. He won the NSSAR President General Robert B. Vance award for 2016-2017, for best SAR Chapter website. Compatriot Marsh is a member of the Georgia Fellows. Congratulations to you, Compatriot Richard Marsh.

Our next recipient also has been a very active member in his chapter and at the state level. Don Ray Thomas, Sr has been a member of the SAR since March 31, 2000, joining the William Few Chapter. Compatriot Thomas is also a charter and founding member of the Washington-Wilkes Chapter, and charter and founding member of the Little River Chapter. He has served as Chapter President, Treasurer and Sergeant-at-Arms for the Washington-Wilkes Chapter. He is currently serving as the Chapter Newsletter Editor for the Little River Chapter. Compatriot Thomas is a Past Georgia Society Regional Vice President for the Northeast Region. Compatriot Thomas has served as the Chairman of the Education Outreach Committee for the William Few Chapter and currently holds that position for the Little River Chapter. He funded and began his own Traveling Trunk Kit. He has presented the Traveling Trunk and other colonial / revolutionary era educational programs to over 8,000 youth and adults in a wide variety of settings. He is a 2 time recipient of the Georgia Society SAR John Dooly Education Outreach Award. This award goes to a Georgia Society member who has significantly contributed their time and efforts in an outstanding manner to our youth and adult education outreach program as a member of the SAR. He is a member of the Georgia Society SAR Color Guard having participated in over 200 Color Guard Events at the state and chapter levels. 
















2022 Congress Planning Committee Co - Chair gave an update on the state of the fast approaching event, and called for all to volunteer.

Color Guard Commander Change of Command

The position of Color Guard Commander is an exacting one. The Commander must respond to the requests for the State Color Guard to appear at events, inform the Color Guard members, including the Elijah Clarke Militia of the locations, times, specific requests, needs, etc. He must carry and coordinate the flags, stands and holders, survey the site to determine the correct equipment needs and their best utilization; consider host requests; organize the procession; and take accurate rolls of participants, Grave locations, GPS coordinates, and process appropriate medal requests from the active Color Guard and Militia. He gets the pleasure of awarding certain recognitions each year. The work is, as stated before, demanding. Several individuals have held the Color Guard Commander position in the Georgia Society.

As one Commander relinquishes command to another, a ceremony is often performed. The Guidon / Standard or pennant represents the Color Guard, and passing it from old to new has become a tradition. There is a military order to the exchange which basically involves the following: The Outgoing commander passes the guidon to his Subordinate, who grasps it with his right hand above his left hand at a 45 degree angle, then returns it to vertical. This procedure allows the guidon to be over the heart of each individual involved. The subordinate officer exchanges the guidon with the incoming subordinate, who then passes the guidon to the incoming commander. The Incoming commander then presents the guidon to the President, who returns it, installing the Commander. Rather involved, but the concept of changing command and accepting responsibility is never an easy or simple task.

















The Gorget, a crescent shaped metal ornament, was the symbol of command. The Georgia Color Guard Commander wears one as symbol of his authority. The names inscribed on the back of the Gorget are:
