
Lafayette at the US Capital and the Fairfield University Symposium

The President's Dispatch (Cont.)

The fourth quarter started with Fall Leadership in Louisville, where many Georgia Society Compatriots gathered for fellowship and to conduct the business of the National Society. Much work is done at Leadership meetings, as the Committees and Trustees meet to plan for our organization's future. The Fall meeting always has the potential to be contentious due to the presentation of the budget, but Treasurer General (Georgia's own) Allen Greenly put together a plan that is a good first step in pulling us out of our current financial situation. I attended no fewer than seven Committee meetings, plus two Executive Committees and the Trustees meeting, as well as participating in the Color Guard and serving as the Master of Ceremonies for the Saturday Banquet. I would encourage anyone who is interested in learning more about how the National Society works to join us at Spring Leadership on Feb 27-Mar 1.

Much like at Leadership, the Georgia Society took up the issue of our budget at the Fall Board of Managers meeting. Treasurer Scott Collins did his usual admirable job of keeping us in good financial shape, especially considering the massive increase we faced with our insurance renewal earlier this year.

As we closed out the year, the focus was on dues collection and the retention of our members. This is always a bit of a touchy subject, as no one likes asking for money, but it is sometimes a necessary evil. As I reviewed the year-end Chapter reports, I'm happy to see that most Chapters were successful in their efforts. The target to qualify for the Distinguished Chapter Award is 90%, and several reached that number or higher. The reconciliation process will begin soon, so any dues not submitted to the State should be sent as soon as possible (if you're reading this in The Hornet's Nest, it's probably already too late, but we can still process a reinstatement after the reconciliation process is complete).

I hope you will plan to join us at the Annual Meeting in Peachtree Corners, GA, at the end of January. We will be joined by President General Darryl Addington and First Lady Mary, as well as at least two other General Officers of the Society. We will recognize the winners of several of our Youth Awards Contests, and we will remember those Compatriots who passed on in the previous year. We will conduct our usual business during the Board of Managers Meeting, and we will elect the Officers who will serve during the 2025 term. We are at a new hotel this year, so I'm sure there will be some bumps in the road, but Conference Planning Chair Wayne Brown ensures me that we are on track for another outstanding event.

Thank you for all you do to support the Georgia Society, its members, and the National Society SAR.





After the successful ambush, Boyd ordered his men to retreat to the camp by Kettle Creek. In one of those events frequently labeled as fate, Boyd fell to the ground, dying from a musket ball. Before he could reach the relative safety of his main force, Boyd was hit several times, falling mortally wounded on the field of battle.

As Pickens attacked in the center, his flanking columns under John Dooly and Elijah Clarke emerged from swampy ground on the left and right to join the assault on the Tory's main line. Boyd's regiment was now led by Major William Augustus Spurgeon Jr. the role despite only being third-in-command. Spurgeon's nominal superior, Lt. Col. John Moore, was either unwilling or unable to exercise the responsibility of command.

As the enemy line began to collapse, Col. Clarke noticed a ridge on the creek's south side that the Tories could potentially use as a rallying point on which to reform. Despite having his horse shot out from under him, Clarke took a portion of his company across the creek. As Clarke advanced up one side of the ridge, a portion of the Tory regiment under Spurgeon advanced up the other side, attempting to contest Clarke for control of the position.

BLAST FROM THE PAST



"Blast from the Past", looks at some back issue / historic news relevant to the Georgia Society, Sons of the American Revolution. Looking back to Jul -Sep 2011, Education Secretary Terry Manning offered this insight into the early formation of the Georgia Society.

"Pages from GASSAR History: 1921-1939"

While my wife and I were researching old records of the Georgia Society in Louisville in September, the following items caught our eye that may be of interest to several of our chapters:

Formation - The report of the Registrar General in April 1921 noted that, "Through the efforts of President General Preston, a new Society, with 16

members, was organized in [Atlanta] Georgia and a charter to that effect delivered."

First Chapter Charter - In Volume 19 (1924-1925), issue 1, "The Minute Man" (official bulletin of NSSAR) reported under Georgia Society news that, "The new local S.A.R. Chapter, in process of organization at **Dalton**, will be able to announce a perfected organization and personnel of officers in the next issue of THE MINUTE MAN, it is hoped." This initial effort apparently proved futile, as in Volume 22 (1927-1928), issue 2, the Georgia Society reported that, "The first local chapter to which the Georgia Society has given a charter has been formed at **Milledgeville**. The little group of thirteen compatriots located here have applied for and received a

charter and are holding this number, symbolical of the Thirteen Original Colonies, as their "lucky" number."

More New Chapters – In Volume 31, issue 3, of January 1937, the by now "SAR Magazine" mentioned that, "The renewal of activities in the Georgia Society continues to progress with most encouraging results. More than half a hundred new applications since the Portland Congress give evidence of the energetic work of Colonel James D. Watson, President, and his associates. Colonel Watson is planning the formation of chapters wherever the membership quota permits, and the latest to be formally launched is at Athens, which has formally organized under auspicious circumstances. Others are planned for Dalton, Stevens, Valdosta and Bainbridge, and Charter members for these are now being enrolled." It further noted, "WINDER CHAPTER – This newly organized Chapter of the Georgia Society participated in the Armistice Day exercises at Winder by turning out with the Georgia State Flag and American Flag for the civic parade on November 11th."

Athens Charter – The SAR Magazine gave this report of the Athens Chapter in Volume 31, issue 4, of April 1937, "Following the meeting at Atlanta, President General Kendall accompanied Col. Watson, State President...to Athens, where the Charter of this Chapter, and a number of Membership Certificates were presented to the Chapter President, Robert R. Gunn, at a most enthusiastic meeting."

State Flag - In July 1937, the magazine gave this interesting news, "The Georgia Society also paid its compliments to the National Society at the recent annual Congress held at Buffalo, New York, by presenting through Colonel Watson, the Georgia State flag, and this with the Virginia flag which was also presented, completes the collection of flags of the original thirteen states, now owned with other state flags, by the National Society."

1938 – The October 1938 issue of the magazine reported that the **Atlanta Chapter** had doubled its membership during the past year, that the society had presented 37 **R.O.T.C. medals** in May, and it was endeavoring to establish the last resting place of **William Few**, Georgia Signer of the Constitution, believed to be in an unmarked yault in Beacon, New York.

LaGrange Organized – In January 1939, we read that the first formal meeting for purposes of organizing a chapter in LaGrange was held on October 11. The chapter was to be known as "La Grange Chapter No. 5."



Compatriots - Gary Hoyt requested that I lay a wreath on Luther Story's gravestone, a medal of Honor recipient, and I was honored to do so during the Wreaths Across America ceremony today, December 14. I have been a member of the of their Wreaths Across America program at Andersonville for 4 years and it is a moving and humbling experience.

Thanks to Gary for the excellent work he does to honor our troops!

I'm sure many of you participated in these ceremonies across Georgia today, which is very much appreciated! Please forward your news items and photos to Emil Decker for the Hornets Nest. Gary had this to say in an email about Luther Story, a true American hero.

"It was an amazing crowd that gathered for Luther Story's homecoming. Governor Brian Kemp -- and what seemed like half the Georgia State Patrol -- escorted the cortege. His military escort was commanded by a two star army general who also served as the military speaker. The VA does not permit visitors at graveside during the actual burial."

More and more veterans are returning home as a result of advanced DNA identification techniques. I have attended every returning Georgia veteran's funeral, save one. The most recent returnee was PFC Luther E. "Buck" Bagley, a Merrill's Marauder who was killed in action on July 25, 1944. His wife, Eleanor, turned 100 about a week after his funeral. I got to meet her and their son, "Woody," during the reception and funeral. His military escort was made up exclusively of Army Rangers.

Luther Story was a Korean War Medal of Honor Recipient. He served as a Private First Class in the United States Army in Company A, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2d Infantry Division. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for action on September 1, 1950 near Agok, Korea. In April 2023, the Department of Defense announced that Story's remains had been positively identified. He was buried in Andersonville National Cemetery in Section I, Grave 2400 on Memorial Day 2023.

Please share this information with your art, design, and social studies teachers along with parents and families if you choose.

As you may know, **Senate Bill 369** – passed during the 2024 legislative session – calls for the Georgia Departments of Revenue and Education to establish a selection process for the design of a license plate which commemorates the United States of America's semiquincentennial.

In accordance with this legislation, GaDOE and DOR are launching a student license plate design contest to commemorate the semiquincentennial – the 250th anniversary of the 1776 Declaration of Independence, which will be celebrated on July 4, 2026.

The final license plate will be selected from designs **submitted by students in grades six through eight in Georgia schools**. Any student in sixth, seventh, or eighth grade in a Georgia public, private, charter or homeschool may submit an entry. Entries should be submitted by the student's parent/guardian or by their teacher with parent/guardian permission.

GRAVE MARKING CEREMONIES



ENOCH BENSON & ISAAC HORTON



Patriot Benson was a native of Culpepper County, Virginia, where he enlisted and served in the Virginia Line. He later lived in the Greenville District, GC. In 1818, he moved to Gwinnett County, Georgia. He drew land in the 1827 Georgia Land Lottery as a Revolutionary War Soldier and resident of Gwinnett County. In 1840, he was drawing a pension for his services. The cemetery located nails in the soil with a metal detector at the site of his marking.






Patriot Horton was a soldier in the Continental Line and drew land in the 1832 Georgia Cherokee Land Lottery as a Revolutionary War Soldier and resident of Barker's District in Gwinnett County. In 1840, he was drawing a pension for his services. Isaac is buried in the Sugar Hill Baptist Church Cemetery.





















GABRIEL SMITH JR.







Patriot Gabriel Smith Jr. enlisted 1780, in Montgomery County, NC. Militia with Capt Thomas Child's Company. He later received a pension for his services and drew land in the 1825 Georgia Lottery as a Revolutionary War Soldier and resident of Franklin County. He rests in the Poplar Springs Primitive Baptist Church Cemetery.

























NATHANIEL BOWLES



Patriot Nathan Valentine Bowles served in the Continental line, and received land in the 1825 Jackson Co, GA Land Lottery, 2 Draws for Revolutionary Service.

CAPT JAMES NEPHEW a patriot of Liberty and McIntosh Counties, served in the Col John Baker's Regiment, Liberty Co., GA Militia. Patriot John Calder served as a pvt. in the Georgia Militia under Colonel Elijah Clarke. In 1782, he enlisted in the South Carolina Lighthouse Dragons in Captains Harvey and Johnson's Companies commanded by Colonel Samuel Hammond. He was severely wounded in the Battle of Eutaw Springs and later was in General Andrew Pickens' Indian Expedition. He fought in the Battle of Little Terrapin, received a pension for services and is buried in Calder Cemetery



JAMES GIGNILLIAT, Sr.,
(pronounced "Gin Lat") was a
native of St. John's Parish,
Berkeley County, SC. He served as
an officer in the South Carolina
Army or Militia from the
Beaufort District. After the war,
he settled on an inland rice
plantation called Contentment."
He served as the Commissioner of
the Peace in the Beaufort District,
South Carolina and later was a
delegate to the National
Convention from McIntosh
County, Georgia.







JOHN COOPER served as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Georgia Troops, and later a Commissioner of the Peace.
Tradition has him wounded twice during the Battle of Bull Town Swamp as he led the calvary charge in Savannah after Pulaski's fall.



























JOHN IREDELL TATE

John Tredell Tate, originally a

native of Londonderry, Ireland, he came to America in 1763. He enlisted in Shippensburg, Pennsylvania and served as a private under Colonel Dunlap. After the war, he lived in Maryland, Pittsburgh, and Burke County, NC.

In 1796, he moved to Franklin County, Georgia where he drew land in the 1825 and 1827 Georgia Land lotteries. He later received a pension for his services.



































Boys and girls, are frequently kidnapped from their parents and then sold to sex traffickers in the US.







Description: Dignitaries and SAR personnel portraying Revolutionary War soldiers will meet Lafayette as he arrives at the Oconee River Landing at the Oconee River Greenway. Afterwards, Lafayette and dignitaries will ride by carriage from the Oconee River Landing at the Greenway to the Western steps of The Old Capital Building escorted by Cadet Command of the GMC 146th Corp of Cadets. 2:30 PM-3:15 PM: Lafavette Visits the Grave of Abner Hammond and Thomas Petters Carnes

Description: General Lafayette will visit Historic Memory Hill Cemetery in downtown Milledgeville accompanied by guests, members of the SAR and DAR, members of the AFL, and other dignitaries to visit and pay respects at the grave of Abner Hammond who served as a lieutenant and later Captain in the South Carolina Troops during the Revolutionary War and also fought at the Siege of Augusta in 1781. He also served as Secretary of State of Georgia from 1811-1823. General Lafayette will also visit and pay respects at the grave of Thomas Peters Carnes who served as a colonel in the Maryland Line during the Revolutionary War and afterwards as a judge, member of Congress, and surveyor who helped map the boundary between Tennessee and Georgia. Wreaths will be placed

at the graves of both patriots by General Lafayette. (Sherill Jones, Chairwoman).

6:30 PM-9:00 PM: Lafayette Ball at The Old Capital Building

Description: General Lafayette will be the guest of honor at the 200th Anniversary Lafayette Ball in the legislative chambers of The Old Capital Building on the grounds of Georgia Military College. The ball will include a cash bar, pre-dinner hors d'oeuvres, and a plated meal. Tickets will have to be purchased in advance. The ball will be a black-tie affair, but guests may also come in period clothing from the era. A jazz ensemble and dancers from GCSU will provide entertainment along with a classical pianist from GMC. Cash bar and hors d'oeuvres will be served from 6:30-7:15 and dinner/ceremony begins at 7:15 PM.

Our Savannah events are facing serious issues due to conflict with the St Patrick's day activities, but we are trying to work around those concerns and will let you know our plans soon. The Lafayette events in all other locations are nearing completion and are progressing well.

Bylaws - Ed Rigel Sr.

General Subject Matter: Bring the GA SAR into compliance with its Bylaws regarding preparation of the Society's Annual Budget.

Reason: It was brought to the Bylaws Committee Chairman's attention by the Finance Committee Chairman that there is a discrepancy between instructions in the GA SAR Bylaws and what is being practiced by the Society.

Currently Bylaws Article VI Financial Matters Section 3 -- Budget "The Finance Committee shall prepare an Annual Budget for the next calendar year of the Society".

In practice, and in contradiction to the Bylaws, the GA SAR Treasurer prepares, reports

on and presents the next year's Budget.

The proposed amendments will shift the designated responsibility from the Finance Committee to the Treasurer.

Bylaws Article No. V Committees, Section 4 Standing Committees, Finance Committee revised as follows:

Finance Committee - This committee shall consist of at least three members in good standing: a chairman appointed by the President and a maximum of two other members appointed by the chairman with the approval of the Executive Committee. The Treasurer serves as an ex-officio member of the committee, but without vote. The committee shall provide oversight over financial management of the State Society finances except for the Endowment Trust Fund. It will review any regular quarterly reports of the Treasurer and the Audit Committee and use reported data to assess compliance with budget restrictions; ensure restricted funds are managed, transferred, and/or collected as required; assess the investment of the excess unreserved fund balance; evaluate the method and cost of Internal Revenue Service reporting; maintain guidelines in the Source Book for financial management; assist the

Treasurer in budget preparation; and evaluate the appropriateness of the annual membership fee. The committee will make status reports on areas reviewed, make recommendations to the Executive Committee and Board of Managers in regard to any improvements deemed necessary, and report follow-up on prior recommendations of the Finance Committee and the Audit Committee.

Article No. VI, Section 3, revised as follows: The Treasurer, with assistance from the Finance Committee shall prepare an Annual Budget for the next calendar year of the Society in which are listed the categories and amounts of anticipated income and expenses of the State Society and shall submit it to the Executive Committee for its consideration, comments or recommendations. It shall then be submitted to the Board of Managers for approval and adoption at its Fall Meeting. The Finance Committee may make transfers between or adjustments to line items but not exceeding 10 percent of the amount originally approved for said line item. The Executive Committee may approve such adjustments of more than 10 percent but not exceeding 25 percent. The Board of Managers may make any changes to the budget.

VETTED – GASSAR Chapter Revolutionary War Patriot Grave Ceremonies for Calendar Year 2024

During 2024, the Graves Committee vetted the following Revolutionary War Patriots for Grave Marking future events. Some have been scheduled and some of their ceremonies performed.

Patriot James Tate, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-301943. Based on research, this Patriot was buried on now industrial property located at 3508 Old Dixie Hwy SE, Dalton, Whitfield Co., GA. This was requested by Bryan Acree of the Dalton Chapter SAR. Scheduling has not been determined as of this date, as an alternate grave marking location will likely be utilized.

Patriot John Taliaferro, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-301599, Patriot David Clay, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-134407, and Patriot John Hatcher, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-177426. During the vetting of these three (3) Patriot's graves located in Wilkerson County, GA, the Graves Committee located and vetted another Patriot, Robert Etheridge, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-327878. It is likely upon scheduling this event that all four (4) Patriots will be honored for an SAR grave marking at a single event at Mount Nebo Church Cemetery in McIntyre, Wilkinson Co., GA. This was requested by Bill Schultz of the Button Gwinnett Chapter SAR. Scheduling has not been determined as of this date, as permissions must be secured.

Patriot John Cash, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-130073. This Patriot died 13 Aug 1836 in Henry Co., GA. This was requested by Don McCarty of the Button Gwinnett Chapter and Bruce Maney of the Blue Ridge Mountains Chapter. Scheduling has not been determined as of this date, since a suitable location and permissions must be secured for this event.

Patriot Edward Williams, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-320654. This Patriot died after 1840 and is buried in Chechero Baptist Church Cemetery, Clayton, Rabun Co., GA, and a stone with the initials "E. W." is carved on it. There has been work done by the Graves Chairman, Don McCarty, in the South Carolina State Archives during 2023 to obtain the military records found in the South Carolina Militia Audited Accounts. A number of descendants have been identified of this Patriot by Lyn Cash, Past President of the Habersham Chapter SAR. Several Georgia Society SAR Chapters have expressed interest in co-sponsoring the SAR grave marking for this Patriot. Scheduling has not been determined as of this date.

Patriot Stephen Day, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-145426. This was requested by D. Alan Smith of William Few Chapter SAR. Based on The Revolutionary Records of the State of Georgia, Vol 2, by Allen D. Candler, 1908, The Franklin - Turner Company Publisher, Atlanta, Georgia, page 757, Patriot Stephen Day received a Land Warrant of 200 acres in Richmond County for his Revolutionary War service as a soldier. Stephen Day was born in 1742 in Lancaster Co., PA and died on 5 Dec 1825 in Columbia County, GA He is buried in the Stephen Day Family Cemetery in Grovetown, Columbia Co., GA.

Patriot Gabriel Smith, Sr., NSSAR Patriot ID: P-291955. This was requested by Jim Swinson of the Casimir Pulaski

Chapter SAR. Patriot Gabriel Smith was born 12 Dec 1764 in Anson Co., NC and he enlisted in Montgomery Co., NC, in August 1780, and served under Capt. Thomas Childs while engaged at the Battle of Bettis Bridge on Drowning Creek. In the 1840 U.S. Census for Carroll Co., GA., District 754, page 9, Gabriel Smith Sr. was enumerated in age bracket 70-80, which corroborated his age to be 75, based on his 1832 Franklin County pension statement that he was age 67 at that date. Listed after Gabriel Smith Sr. on the census page was Gabriel Smith Jr., who many members of the DAR and SAR have proven lineage. Gabriel Smith, Sr. died before 13 Aug 1841 in Carroll Co., GA.

Enoch Benson, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-113496 and Isaac Brissell Horton, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-185099. These two Patriots were requested by Don McCarty, Eldon Evans and Bruce Maney of the Button Gwinnett Chapter Graves Committee. These Patriots were well-documented for their service and their grave locations are known. Enoch Benson's grave is located in Kile Homeplace Cemetery, Sugar Hill, Gwinnett Co., GA, while Isaac Benson's grave is located in the Old Level Cemetery, Sugar Hill, Gwinnett Co., GA.

Nathaniel Valentine Bowles, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-118682. This Patriot was requested by Carter J. Wood, President of Lyman Hall Chapter SAR. This Patriot's grave is in the Apple Valley Baptist Church Cemetery, Commerce, Jackson County, GA. During the Patriot Graves Committee review, it was determined that Patriot Bowles was living in the McGinnis District of Jackson Co., GA and received land in the 1832 Georgia Land Lottery in Cherokee Co., GA and was listed as a Revolutionary War Soldier. Further, the Committee determined that the Veteran's Administration Headstone had incorrectly stated the death date as 1834. Our records review determined that the Patriot Bowles was born 21 Jan 1762 in Virginia, married Milly Dawson 11 Dec 1787 in Virginia, and died before May 1833 in Georgia.

John Calder, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-127236, James Gignilliat, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-165877, Lt Col. John Cooper, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-138554, and Capt. James Nephew, NSSAR ID: P-255407. These Patriots were requested by Steven Hinson, President of the Marshes of Glynn Chapter SAR. All 4 Patriots were well documented by the PRS and DAR sources and are buried in the Contentment Bluff Plantation Cemetery, in Townsend, McIntosh Co., GA.

George Snelling, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-292618. This was requested by Russell Terrell, President of the Samuel Elbert Chapter SAR. Unfortunately, the Patriot Graves Committee could NOT approve this person due to lack of direct evidence for his Revolutionary War service. There have been no SAR members approved for George Snelling. George Snelling's NSDAR # 106485 has 11 approved NSDAR members. One NSDAR member marked George Snelling's grave in Elbert County, GA and obtained a Veteran's Administration Headstone using evidence from the pre-1940s. In the DAR online records, they indicate that new NSDAR applicants will have to show proof of service for George Snelling. After some 40+ hours of research, the Patriot has

Graves Committee could not locate proof of service that would satisfy the NSSAR Manual for Patriot Grave Markings. The Samuel Elbert Chapter SAR has withdrawn its current plans for a grave marking for George Snelling.

John Iredell Tate, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-301951. This was requested by Emil Decker of the Robert Forsyth Chapter SAR, who had been contacted by Regent of the Sequoyah Chapter. Georgia State NSDAR to invite the Georgia Society SAR to participate. The NSDAR Historian General had reviewed the documentation for this Patriot and approved this grave marking event by letter dated September 16, 2024. The Georgia Society SAR Graves Committee concurred with this approval for the SAR Grave Marking.

Thomas Bruford/Buford, NSSAR Patriot ID P-125075. This was requested by Anita Bianconi, Commander of the Georgia Brigade of the Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge (DVF). She has invited Georgia Society SAR to participate with DVF as they would like to have a joint Patriot Grave Marking for this Patriot who was at Valley Forge with George Washington's Army. Coordination is now underway with the Lyman Hall Chapter SAR to be the primary sponsor, since the Patriot is buried the church cemetery of the Lanier Point Church. This Patriot's grave was reinterred to the current location due to the construction of Lake Lanier. Scheduling of the SAR Grave Marking is expected for late Spring of 2025.

TO VET – GASSAR Chapter Revolutionary War Patriot Grave Ceremonies for Calendar Year 2024

Through December 31, 2024, the Graves Committee has had no additional requests for Patriots to Vet for Grave Markings. There have been discussions with both SAR and NSDAR members regarding planning for future Patriot grave markings and we await their documentation for official requests.

PATRIOT GRAVE MARKINGS PLANNED - GASSAR Chapter Patriot Grave Ceremonies for Calendar Year 2025

The William Few Chapter SAR is sponsoring a SAR Grave Marking for Patriot Stephen Day, NSSAR Patriot ID: P-145426. This event will be held at the Grovetown City Hall, located at 103 Old Wrightsboro Road, Grovetown, Columbia Co., GA 30813.

At the Georgia Society SAR Annual Conference on January 31, 2025, the Georgia Society SAR plans to honor thirteen (13) Georgia Society SAR Chapters for sponsoring/co-sponsoring those sixteen (16) Revolutionary War Patriots graves that were marked and provided documentation for updating the Patriot Research System (PRS).





Who was the first U.S. President to get a raise??

During his second term, Ulysses S. Grant got the first raise Congress ever approved for the president. George Washington's salary in 1789 was set at \$25,000, and it remained at that level for 84 years until Grant's raise in 1873. Congress doubled Grant's salary to \$50,000 in what critics at the time called the "Salary Grab Act." The current salary for the U.S. president is \$400,000 plus another roughly \$170,000 in various expense, travel, and entertainment accounts.
