## AN ACT

To incorporate the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Bo it enacted by the Sonate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That Francis Honry Appleton, of Massachusetts; Lucius P. sacrifices during the war of the American Revolution;
achieved the independence of the American people; to
unite and promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the Government found.
ed by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution; to acquire and preserve

the records of the individual services of the patriols of the war, as well as documents, relics, and landmarks; to mark the scenes of the Revolution by appropriate memorials; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war and of the Revolutionary period; to foster true patriolism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, and to carry out the purposes expressed in the preamble to the Constitution of our country and the injunctions of Washington in his farewell address to the American people.

Sec. 3. That said sorporation shall have power to receive, purchase, hold, sell, and sonvey real and personal estate, so far only as may be necessary or convenient for its lowful purposes, to an amount not exceeding at any one time in the aggregate five hundred thousand dollars; to sue and be sued, somplain and defend in any rourl; to adopt a sommon seal, and to alter the same at pleasure; to make and adopt a sonstitution, by laws, rules, and regulations for admission, government, suspension, and espulsion of its members, and from time to time to alter and repeal such constitution, by laws, rules, and regulations, and to adopt others in their places; to provide for the election of its officers and to define their duties; to provide for State societies or chapters with

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rules for their conduct, and to regulate and provide for the management, safe keeping, and protection of its property and funds: <u>Provided always</u>, That such constitution, by laws, rules, and regulations be not inconsistent with the laws of the United States or any of the States thereof.

Sec. A. That the property and affairs of said corporation shall be managed by mot more than sisty nor less than forty trustees, who shall be elected annually at such time as shall be fixed in the byrlaws, and at least one trustee shall be elected annually from a list of nominees to be made by each of the State societies and submitted to this society at least thirty days before the annual meeting, in accordance with general provisions regulating such nominations as may be adopted by this society.

Sec. 5. That the first meeting of this corporation shall be held on a call issued by any fifteen of the above-numed corporators by a written notice signed by them, stating the time and place of meeting, addressed locach of the ever-porators personally named herein and deposited in the post-office at least five days before the day of meeting.

Sec. 6. That this churter shall take offect upon its being accepted by a mujerity rele of the corporators named herein who shall be present at said meeting, or at any other meeting specially called for that purpose; and

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notice of such acceptance shall be given by said corporalion by causing a certificate to that effect signed by its president and secretary to be filed in the office of the Secretary of State.

Sec. T. Thul. Congress reserves the right to alter, amond, or repeal this Act.
